Illegal Defensive Positioning

The Rules Committee's emphasis on illegal defensive positioning is not intended to increase the frequency of fouls called on the defense. It's a clarification of the process and understanding of these fouls and to minimize injuries in the critical scoring area.

When a defender is in three seconds or the free space to

goal she illegally occupies a space to which she is not entitled and is reducing opportunities for the offense to safely attack. Additionally, the defender is placing herself at risk of injury.

For illegal defensive positioning associated with obstruction of <u>free space to</u> goal to occur, the attack must

create opportunity. First, the ball must be above the goal line extended and within the Critical Scoring Area. Second, the attacker must physically have the potential to shoot, and the path to goal must be clear of legal defenders. If opportunity to shoot does not exist, the call should not be made.

9.1 PEN Situation B:

Immediately following an indirect restart, the ball carrier is running in the direction of the goal as a defense player jumps into the free space to goal. The official whistles for Obstruction of free Space to Goal. **Ruling:** Incorrect. The conditions for a shot to be taken have not been met, therefore, Obstruction of Free Space to Goal may not be called.

Open games on ASO can be self-assigned. The self-assign feature can be accessed by clicking on schedule tab and then on the self-assign tab on the gray task bar. Only games that fit your Arbiter availability (time and distance) will be listed. They will also email openings as the game date gets close.

CHSAA assigners do not use self-assign. Each assigner uses email to communicate openings. Some will communicate at least weekly.

The assigners may try to fill openings by assigning an official that indicates in Arbiter that they are available. This process requires that you keep your availability in Arbiter updated with any availability changes to avoid getting assignments that you cannot accept. We all have things that come up, so please do your best to keep your Arbiter blocks current.

There have been a number of turn backs from the auto assign involving time and distance issues. You can prevent these assignments by using the block features in Arbiter. If you have any questions about Arbiter, please contact cwloaboard@gmail.com and we will try to help you.

Official Mechanics

We're well into our season of officiating, so just a few reminders to help us all step up our game.

1/ Whistle – make your whistle sing. Use varied tone based on the severity of the foul you are calling.

2/ Direction Signal -Who committed the foul? With your back to the sideline, put your arm up so that it is horizontal in the direction play will resume, hold it there a

bit so that your partner, coaches and players all have a same as with Offender - what chance to see it.

3/ Foul Signal – What is the foul? Show the foul signal; be 5/ Whistle/Drop Arm - make demonstrative. Again hold the signal long enough for others to see it.

4/ Placement of players: B-O-O.

Ball, who gets the ball; Offender, Where does the Offender go? (Was it a major, minor, Goal Circle, RL, or Misconduct foul) and where did the foul occur (mid-field, over the RL, CSA, 12m Fan, 8M arc, goal circle);

Others, considerations are the the foul was and where it occurred.

quick eye contact with your partner, Restart Play - raise your arm just prior to blowing your whistle and drop your arm after blowing your whistle.

Carding:

- 1. Signal time out
- 2. Turn and face score table
- 3. Show appropriate card and the foul signal (Slash, dangerous follow through, etc.)
- 4. Make eye contact with

partner to make sure s/he is aware of the card

- 5. A player is removed for 2 minutes (yellow) or 4 min. (USL Red) of playing time and reports to the penalty box
- 6. Table side official repeats foul, players number and shows card to table (to be recorded by the scorekeeper)
- 7. Make eye contact with partner to make sure they are ready (not writing the penalty)
- 8. Restart play with whistle and arm signal.
