Special Note: As the season progresses and you have changes to your personal schedule, it is important that you remember to keep your Arbiter blocks up to date. Schedules tend to get compacted at the end of the season when missed games are being rescheduled. It is really helpful and time saving for the assignors to know that your blocks are up to date.

Official Mechanics Reminders

of officiating, so just a few reminders to help us all step up our game.

1/ Whistle – make your whistle sing. Use varied tone based on the severity of the foul you are calling.

2/ Direction Signal – Who committed the foul? With

your back to the sideline,

put your arm up so that it is horizontal in the direction play will resume, hold it there a bit so that your partner, coaches and players all have a chance to see it.

3/ **Foul Signal** – What is the foul? Show the foul signal; be demonstrative. Again hold the signal long enough for others to see it.

4/ Placement of players: B-O-O.

Ball, who gets the ball; Offender, Where does the Offender go? (Was it a major, minor, Goal Circle, RL, or Misconduct foul) and where did the foul occur (mid-field, over the RL, CSA, 12m Fan, 8M arc, goal circle);

Others, considerations are

the same as with Offender – what the foul was and where it occurred.

5/ Whistle/Drop Arm – make quick eye contact with your partner, Restart Play – raise your arm just prior to blowing your whistle and drop your arm after blowing your whistle.

Open games on ASO can be self-assigned. The self-assign feature can be accessed by clicking on schedule tab and then on the self-assign tab on the gray task bar. Only games that fit your Arbiter availability (time and distance) will be listed. They will also email openings as the game date gets close.

CHSAA assigners do not use self-assign. Each assigner uses email to communicate openings. Some will communicate at least weekly.

The assigners may try to fill openings by assigning an official that indicates in Arbiter that they are available. This process requires that you keep your availability in Arbiter updated with any availability changes to avoid getting assignments that you cannot accept. We all have things that come up, so please do your best to keep your Arbiter blocks current.

There have been a number of turn backs from the auto assign involving time and distance issues. You can prevent these assignments by using the block features in Arbiter. If you have any questions about Arbiter, please contact cwloaboard@gmail.com and we will try to help you.

Self-Start Review

The basic essence of the rule is this: "For a whistle blown for a foul outside the critical scoring area, the player who is awarded the free position, after coming to a stop/settled stance, may continue the course of play without waiting for an additional whistle."

A more detailed description of the rule follows: The offending player must immediately move 4 meters behind or to the side of the player taking the free position, as indicated by the official. Any other player(s) within 4m must move to a position indicated by the official. All players farther than 4m from the foul must "stand" until ball carrier resumes play. The option of self-starting is administered at the spot of the foul. However, if the ball is within playing distance (a

stick and-a-half length away) from the player who is awarded the free position, the player who is awarded the free position may pick up the ball and, from a settled stance, self-start from that location.

If the ball ends up outside the playing distance of the foul, the player who has been awarded the free position and the ball must return to the spot of the foul for the self-start. If the spot of the foul cannot be determined, the official shall indicate the location of the free position.

If the player who has been awarded the free position chooses to self-start, the defensive players may engage immediately following the selfstart. The ball carrier does not have to wait for all other players to be in position before she self-starts. The ball carrier may also elect to wait for the official's whistle to restart play.

If any player moves prior to the player who has been awarded the free position, this results in a false start and shall be penalized at the spot of the ball. Repeated false starts or delays in moving 4m by the defense may result in a delayof-game card.

To resume play when the ball has gone out of bounds, the closest player of the team awarded possession of the ball may commence play with a self-start, relative to the spot from where the ball went out of bounds. The player may commence play, from a settled stance, with a self-start within 2m of the boundary line. All other players must be at least 1m from the ball carrier.

Tell us how you first became involved with officiating women's lacrosse
